Pint of Science 2019 Comes to Lincoln



On May 20th- 22nd 2019 University of Lincoln staff and students took their research to the pubs of Lincoln as Pint of Science came to the city for the first time. 18 talks were given by 20 researchers across 3 evenings in 3 venues. The Lion & Snake, Caffe Portico and The Pessimist welcomed members of the public to come and explore the discoveries of University of Lincoln researchers.

Talk topics included 'Being a virtual patient – does it help?', 'Promoting optimal experiences in exercise: time to change our approach?', 'A byte of music' and 'Why does

PEARL Grant-holder launch event: International Working Group for the Prevention of Online Sex Offending



A new report, involving over 2,000 experts in online child sex offending, has made strong recommendations on how to better prevent the growing problem of child sexual offending on the internet. Policy makers, representatives from child services, treatment providers, law enforcement agencies and academia were invited to a PEARL Activity grant-supported launch event on 21st June, where the [report](#) was released.

The report's recommendations come amid the group's concerns about 'epidemic levels' of child sexual exploitation material (CSEM) offending online. The number of UK-related case referrals received by the National Crime Agency from the online industry almost trebled between 2016 and 2018 - rising from 43,072 case referrals in 2016 to 113,948 in 2018.

Key recommendations include; promote public engagement; develop an international agreement; establish effective training and development; develop programmes of prevention focused research. Working with those in international law enforcement, academia, offence management, and treatment services IWG_OSO is developing a framework for better online child sexual offence management and prevention. On June 5th Year 12 students from schools and colleges across Lincolnshire celebrated their hard work and achievement at the Research Higher Spring Graduation ceremony at the University of Lincoln. Research Higher offers pupils the chance to participate in an 8-week course offering an immersive experience of University life.

The experience includes seminars and lectures delivered at the University as well as embarking on independent study to design and complete a research project. The programme offers the chance to experience Higher Education whilst developing research skills. Student research projects are themed around Higher Education, offering a unique chance for students to gather insider research about what enables HE participation within their locations. Project topics included 'how gender influences degree choices' and 'how student finance affects decisions to go to university'.

Drawing on more than four decades of research conducted throughout the world, Professor Mark Macklin considers how rivers shaped early societies and, more recently, how urbanisation, industrialisation and intensified agriculture have transformed river systems, compromising planetary health. Humanity now faces an existential environmental catastrophe of its own making and it will be on the world's most densely populated floodplains where this crisis will be played out. Interdisciplinary

We are looking for older adults to participate in our project aimed at reducing feelings of loneliness

What will I have to do?

- 1) observe varied images (e.g. animals, objects, abstract) on a screen, while a camera records your eye movements;
- 2) provide saliva samples into a tube to measure a chemical associated with sociability;
- 3) fill out a couple of questionnaires on life views;
- 4) wear a heart rate monitor around your chest;
- 5) play a game on a computer.

How long will it take? 1h-1h30



Requirements:

- 60 years or older.
- No uncorrected vision problems (glasses or lenses are ok).
- To not eat, drink (except for water) or exercise up to 2h before the session
